



SASKATCHEWAN SOUTHWEST SANDHILLS

The Southwest Sandhills Natural Area contains unique habitats that support a bunch of different species. The area features large tracts of native grasslands, sand dunes and sandy prairie, the Great Sand Hills, as well as a large section of the South Saskatchewan River. It provides habitat for 39 species at risk, including burrowing owl, chestnut-collared longspur, piping plover, monarch butterfly, little brown myotis and Ord's kangaroo rat.

The Southwest Sandhills Natural Area Conservation Plan will help conserve the amazing biodiversity found in this area, decrease key threats and help the species that live here. Support from partners such as SaskEnergy ensures that NCC's work, along with other partner organizations, can continue to support these vital habitats and species long-term.
